5. Brief Description of Module (purpose, principal aims and objectives)

Background

The development of pattern cutting techniques and printed textiles delivered in this module builds on the foundations already acquired at level 4. Students will be required to engage with a more indepth visual and conceptual exploration and document more detailed, analytical and evaluative research that considers the work within an appropriate contextual framework. Exploring themes around drawing, motif development, repeat structures, colour, 3D form, pattern making, garment construction, fit and illustration.

The work may be produced in response to a set theme or national student competition where appropriate.

This module will culminate with the production of resolved practical work, supported by primary and secondary research material that demonstrates a greater degree of independent engagement and a willingness to take risks and be ambitious.

Purpose

This module is intended to support students in developing their skills as designers and makers. With a particular focus on the research and development of original ideas, the impact of scale and colour and translating 2D ideas into 3D forms.

Principal aims and objectives

A principle aim of this module is to provide an opportunity to broaden the practical and conceptual scope of work produced and to further develop and refine individual practical interests focus for level 6. Students will also develop confidence as both print and or fashion designers and understand how knowledge of practical skill underpins the development of ideas. In addition to this, soft skills such as organisation planning and time management will all be addressed.

At this stage of the course there is scope for students to independently develop their work, and explore personally identified interests. The work submitted should be sufficient in content and volume to demonstrate that the learning outcomes have been met to the minimum standard in relation to the various practices or processes explored.

Contextual Research includes all contextual research and written commentary produced in relation to outcomes 3. This may be incorporated in sketchbooks or as a separate document, but will most likely include both. There should be evidence of a range of practitioners, approaches and historical precedents being consulted, sufficient to demonstrate that a breadth of material has been consulted.

and print processes for fabric. Through weekly workshop sessions, based on their ongoing design work, students will explore contemporary pattern cutting processes which may include; soft tailoring techniques and elements of TR cutting (transformational

reconstruction). In print they will typically practice such things as working with pigments, binders, devore pastes and cross dyeing.

An understanding of how their personal practice will also be explored through an examination of historical and contemporary work and outcomes this will be evidenced through the submission of a portfolio of practical work, sketchbooks, related contextual research and written reflection.
