5. Brief Description of Module (purpose, principal aims and objectives)

Background

Throughout their studies, sharing their work with peers and audiences is a key element in the development of students' practice. This may take a variety of forms, including peer group discussions, disseminating work via digital platforms, mid-course exhibitions in public spaces and so on. Students are thus able to share their work and engage with audiences in a professional environment. Along with their Graduate Exhibition, these practices will often form part of the assessment process.

Based on those experiences, at least in part, of sharing their work with others, the final level 6 year of their studies is a largely holistic and integrated affair focussed on the production of a major body of work to be publicly exhibited, displayed or presented as their Graduate Exhibition. As well as being the capstone element of their studies, it is also integral to their planning and preparation for embarking on professional practice in their discipline.

Purpose

The purpose of this module is for students to prepare themselves for entering professional practice, independently planning, researching and developing proposals for a body of art and design work for public exhibition.

Principal aims and objectives

For students to:

- Apply their acquired skills and knowledge to the development of a refined, ambitious and inventive approach to the selection and application of media, techniques, tools and technologies to explore ideas and concepts in a skilled, imaginative manner within the context of their discipline.
- Identify, analyse and critically reflect on the relationship between their own work, that of other artists and contemporary contexts appropriate to their practice and discipline, such as aesthetics, functionality, audiences, clients or markets.
- Develop their capacity for independent critical judgment and reflective self-awareness.
