

Module Title:	Introduction to Research Skills
Module Code:	BAED05C

Credits:	15

Module Description:

This module introduces the theory and practice of research in educational contexts. It provides training in using resources for research and the principles, methods and strategies used in education research, and will equip students with the skills to design and implement small-scale, independent research projects. Using individual and group activities, students explore different research methodologies, study their methods and explore their underlying values and ethics. Students identify a topic for a small-scale research project, and consider the research design and research methods that best meet the project's requirements. Throughout the module, support and guidance is provided on preparing the overarching research questions of a study, and in identifying which research designs and research methods are most suitable to answer those questions.

Indicative Content:

Within the stated aims of the module learning outcomes, the content and delivery methods will be modified to meet the needs of each learning cohort. A general outline of the course is indicated below.

- Understanding research
 - The different approaches to gathering data including positivist and interpretivist methods.
 - Research populations, samples and ethical considerations.
 - Analysing and presenting qualitative and quantitative data.
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Learning and Teaching Methods:

The module will be delivered through a combination of lectures and seminars. Students engage in individual and group activities. Students will be encouraged to learn from key texts and share learning with their fellow students. Self-managed learning and study will supplement lectures. A small-scale individual research project proposal will form part of this module and if required, can be undertaken in the subsequent Research Project 1 module.
