Module Description:

The module considers the main popular music styles and genres from the advent of Rock and Roll through to the present day. It explores the repertoire, styles and related social and economic factors which have influenced the music. Developing a sound methodology for research in popular music underpins the study of particular examples of the repertoire.

- Research techniques: Approaches to the academic research techniques required to study popular music at this level including:
 - o Primary and secondary sources, Internet search, periodicals
 - Critical analysis of sources
 - Comparative analysis
- Writing styles:
 - Abstracts, essay construction, academic writing conventions, Harvard referencing
