#### 5. Brief Description of Module (purpose, principal aims and objectives)

## Background

A particular strength of art and design study is that it develops students' ability to communicate in a variety of formats. For example, the application of intellectual rigour and effective communication characterise their approach to creative and practical work - they serve as the drivers for a methodology that is enquiring, analytical and inventive, but they are also transferable skills that support students' experience in written communication. The more fully they develop their ability in this and other respects, the more likely they are to succeed as practitioners in their field.

## **Purpose**

The purpose of this module is for students to gain a detailed understanding of a particular aspect of their discipline through detailed and focussed research and written communication.

For students to:

- Strengthen their command of research and written communication skills.
- Enhance their ability to independently and effectively communicate in a variety of formats.
- Develop their ability to assimilate complex material and make analytical and independent judgments.
