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#### 1. Welcome from the Dean


Studying a subject at university is a decisive, and deciding, moment in anyone's life.

#### 2. About the Charter

The Student Charter has been developed jointly by students and staff at the University Centre Colchester.

All students are encouraged to read this document so that they know what they can expect, and what is expected of them during their time at University. The Charter is not a binding contract as such, but outlines a commonly accepted set of principles. These principles are based on the understanding that Learning & Teaching at University Centre Colchester is an effective partnership, in which University Centre Colchester and its staff have professional obligations and where students are also responsible for themselves as learners and as individuals.

The Charter is reviewed annually by staff and student representatives.

#### 3. Student Charter

#### **Students can expect University Centre Colchester to:**

- Provide an excellent and varied learning experience;
- Deliver courses with relevant content informed by practitioner research and employer requirements;
- Listen to students by being open to constructive student feedback and encouraging student participation in shaping the learning experience;
- Facilitate access to learning resources that allow students to excel in their studies;
- Offer opportunities to develop skills and knowledge useful for life beyond university;
- Provide support and advice to students in areas such as studying, finance, careers and wellbeing.

#### Students can expect staff to:

- Respond and communicate in a timely and effective manner;
- Offer constructive feedback on course and class work;
- Teach in a communicative and engaging way that promotes learning;
- Provide high quality pastoral and learning support when needed;
- Make reasonable adjustments in line with statutory requirements;
- Acknowledge the student body as being a diverse collection of adults who are partners in the Higher Education experience.

#### University Centre Colchester can expect students to:

- Work with commitment in their studies and to be pro-actively involved in shaping their experience of Higher Education;
- Take every opportunity to enhance their skills and understanding through practical and intellectual activities;
- Be open in disclosing individual learning requirements;
- Understand that their actions affect others, and to act accordingly;
- Be committed to providing constructive feedback on their learning experience;

• Involve themselves in the University Centre Colchester community.

#### Staff can expect students to:

- Be fully committed to their programme, its content and schedule;
- · Reflect, evaluate and enquire in their thinking;
- Be effective managers of their time;
- Have a pro-active approach when seeking help;
- Conduct themselves and approach their work with honesty and courtesy;
- Attend classes and keep appointments.

# The University Centre Colchester community of students and staff can expect each other to:

- Inspire, challenge and support one another intellectually;
- Work collaboratively in an open and positive manner;
- Be accountable for our conduct and actions;
- Treat one another responsibly, respectfully and courteously at all times, both in person and online;
- Be open to, and tolerant of, one another, regardless of background, identity or belief.
